


TROTTER'S CORNER

We are a truly unique program in that our horses are also volunteers, and they are trailered in for their students. Our TROT Family, made up of our students, volunteers, instructor and generous donors, make it possible for us to continue offering this sweetheart program to our growing community. E.A.S.E (Equine Assisted Senior Engagement) is a new program at FENCE aimed at early onset dementia, MCI (mild cognitive impairment), and Parkinson's participants. It is a four-week program consisting of a Spring and Fall session. The goal of this program is to inspire connection and improve the lives of those



impacted by dementia, MCI, and Parkinson's through equine engagement. The program focuses on a sensory experience for each participant while creating a sense of awareness, confidence, and social connection within a structured and supervised environment.

The program takes place at Rosemary's Barn. Participants will spend time and connect with equine animals, along with other therapy pets, in a beautiful, natural setting. Equines are highly intuitive creatures, receptive to both verbal and nonverbal communication.

While the E.A.S.E program targets the care receiver, caregivers can take advantage of their free time running errands or enjoying walks on the nearby FENCE hiking trails.



Susan Beardslee's contribution in replacing the tiles and Bill Crowell's skillful work in fixing up the bench itself truly showcase the power of community and dedication. Now, the Dave Kirby Bench stands proudly once again on Hawks Ridge, ready to be enjoyed by all.

FENCE History

Over Forty years ago, FENCE was a vision by five men who where very involved in the community. Paul Culberson, Jim Flack, Gus Hoffman, Dave Kirby and Tom Moore had a vision of providing greenspace for all generations to use and enjoy.

In 1984 FENCE became a non-profit nature education and outdoor recreation center, built around an original land grant of 117 acres generously contributed by the Mahler family, who had come to Tryon in 1933. Along with the gift of land, the Mahler's included stipulations to ensure that FENCE would meet those broader goals. It was agreed that FENCE would be a 501c3 charitable organization; that it would include a nature side to educate children both at FENCE and in the schools; that it would offer summer camps and ongoing educational and entertainment programs; and that the land would be protected in perpetuity, never to be developed. Since then, FENCE has grown to approximately 384 acres, straddling Interstate 26, with approximately 359 acres in Polk County, NC and approximately 25 acres in Spartanburg County, SC. FENCE serves thousands of people each year with programs in nature study, outdoor recreation and equestrian competition. It is governed by a volunteer board of directors





working with a small salaried staff.

The original 117 acres that the Mahler's donated became the site of a steeplechase course and horse show grounds and riding trails. FENCE's Sandlin Track, named for its builder, measures seven furlongs just under a mile and features rolling hills that give spectators a sweeping view of the horses as they gallop over the fences. The Blockhouse Steeplechase moved from the historic Blockhouse to the new facility at FENCE in 1988 and was the home of the event from 1988 to 2016.

Current Land Uses



The FENCE center houses staff and volunteer offices and meeting rooms as well as facilities for special events. Inside the center it has public restrooms, a kitchen, dining room, outdoor pavilion and lawn areas.



The Equestrian Center is used primarily for equestrian events and activities. The barns and facilities have been used for emergency stabling and shelter for horses escaping storms.



Rosemary's Barn and adjacent riding area are used for TROT (Therapeutic Riding of Tryon) and "Horse Camp"



The Wildwood Trail is an asphalt paved near the Nature Center with interpretive nature signage accessible for everyone.



A "Nature Play Space"
has been developed
off the Wildwood
Trail near the
Mountain Laurel
Natural Area as a
playground utilizing
natural objects and
animal carvings in
logs.



Wooded areas of the property are primarily used for nature exploration and education, hiking and summer day camps, and horseback riding on the FETA trails. High School track teams also use trails for cross-country events.



The Log Cabin is used as an education center and is the information kiosk for spur sections of The Palmetto
Trail, the South Carolina mountains to sea trail.



Open fields are used for passive recreation, dog walking, equestrian cross-country, disc golf, bird walks, and special events such as "Go Fly a Kite" and star gazing.

FENCE Spotlight: ALOOK BACK

1984: The "Founding Five" (Paul Culberson, Jim Flack, Gus Hoffman, Dave Kirby & Tom Moore) turn their vision into a reality and FENCE was born.

1985: Mrs. Ernest Mahler donates 117 acres. Steeplechase course & Nature Pond/Boardwalk break ground. 11 acres was donated by Metcalf & Panther.

1986: The FENCE house, log cabin and Rosemary's Barn (used by TROT) was purchased from the Kimberly Estate, approximately 80 acres.

1987: Final touches to seven furlong steeplechase track and Kidd Barn completed. Construction begins on the judge's towers, show/warm-up rings and cross country course.

1989: "Critter Room" started with funding from PCCF. It houses turtles, snakes, lizards & toads.

1993: FENCE began Project FENCE a school age educational program.

1994: Tryon BBQ Festival held at FENCE. 9 acres donated by George & Dottie Webster.

1995: 10th Anniversary. 2 acres donated by Gerwill & Kramer. 16 acres donated by Pete & Nancy Mahler.

1996: Wildwood Trail, a handicap trail, asphalted. 50th Running of Blockhouse Steeplechase held at FENCE. 35 acres donated by Katherine Metcalf. 50 acres donated by the Lincoln Trust.

2000: FENCE purchased 71 acres to be included in FENCE property to preserve last undeveloped land in Hunting Country.

2002: 71 acres purchased by FENCE.

2004: TROT (Therapeutic Riding of Tryon at FENCE) is certified. FENCE hosts 20th Anniversary Celebration Dinner.

2005: New barns are completed adding 100 new stalls.

2006: Jim Cockman memorial water complex on the cross country course opens. Kimberly Barn had a facelift, became the permanent home for TROT and renamed Rosemarys Barn.

2007: FENCE along with PAC established an easement on all 384 acres protecting the land from development.

2008: Covered arena (later named Chinquapin Arena) was completed.

2012: The "Classroom" is added to the back of the FENCE Center.

2013: Tracie Hanson named Executive Director.

2014: 30th Anniversary.

2017: First annual Round Up Rodeo.

2016: Chinquapin Arena became the home for TROT Lessons.

2019: 35th Anniversary. First annual Roastin' on the Ridge.

2020: FENCE continued to be a safe outdoor space during COVID.

2021: Renovation in the Great Room completed.

2022: Wildwood Trail was repaved. Equestrian sensory trail opened.

2024: Revamping on the downstairs bathrooms began.
